








# Overdose by Race/Ethnicity: Sample

#### Los Angeles County Overdose and Racial/Ethnic Demographics

Data presented on this page are pulled from the California Overdose Surveillance Dashboard for your county.

Any Opioid-Related Overdose Deaths by Race/Ethnicity, 2021 Crude Rate per 100,000 Residents



In 2021, there were **1573 opioid-related** and **1269 psychostimulant-related** overdose deaths.

#### Deaths by Race/Ethnicity

- Opioids: 41.7% were among Hispanic/Latinx residents, 40.1% of deaths were among residents who were white alone, 15.4% were among Black/African American residents, 2.4% were among Asian/Pacific Islander residents, and 0.4% were among Native American/Alaska Native residents. This means that 59.9% of deaths were among people of color.
- Psychostimulants: 39.4% of deaths were among residents who were white alone, 38.9% were among Hispanic/Latinx residents, 17.5% were among Black/African American residents, 3.6% were among Asian/Pacific Islander Residents, and 0.6% were among Native American/Alaska Native residents. This means that 38.9% of deaths were among people of color.








# Revisions to OMB's Statistical Policy Directive No. 15

Effective March 28, 2024

Using one combined question for race and ethnicity, and encouraging respondents to select as many options as apply to how they identify.



Adding Middle Eastern or North African as a new minimum category. The new set of minimum race and/or ethnicity categories are:

- American Indian or Alaska Native
- Asian
- Black or African American
- Hispanic or Latino
- Middle Eastern or North African
- Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander
- White

Requiring the collection of **additional detail beyond the minimum** required race and ethnicity categories for most situations, to ensure further disaggregation in the collection, tabulation, and presentation of data when useful and appropriate.




